WORMALL CIVIL FEATURE PROJECT: THOMAS ROAD

Name of Project: Thomas Road Casuarina Stage 1

Thomas Road Casuarina Stage 1 is a bulk earthworks & civils contract that includes internal subdivision works, Peel Main Drain works and advance works for service relocations on Thomas Road.

The internal subdivision works consisted of earthworks, gravity sewer, stormwater drainage, subsoil, common trench and roadworks. The Peel Main Drain realignment works consisted of realignment of the current open drain through a new underground 900mm diameter piped network.

The existing triple barrel headwall wall crossing under Thomas Road had to be removed and replaced with a new large, custom, in-situ junction pit. The service relocation works along Thomas Road involved the installation of a new water main and gas main including decommissioning of the existing services. A temporary bypass of the existing water distribution main and existing High Pressure Gas main was required as part of service relocation works. The relocation works also involved installation of a new HV network along Thomas Road and the decommissioning of overhead power line through the site.

Works are progressing well on site and the first lot has been sold. Costco have purchased the first lot and the site will home their new second store in Perth. Construction of the new store is about to commence this month.

Construction activities have included some of the milestones listed below:

- 70,000m3 Cut to Fill earthworks
- 75,000m3 Fill Sand Import
- 1.5km of Gravity Sewer with trenches up to 6m deep including dewatering
- 800m of 900mm diameter stormwater drainage for Peel Main Drain realignment with trenches up 4m deep
- 1.3 km of internal stormwater drainage
- 2.1km of internal subsoil drainage
- 2.0 km of 150mm and 225mm diameter Water Main reticulation
- 4km of HV and LV power cable
- 2km of telecommunication conduit
- 13,000 tonne of limestone sub-base
- 8,500 tonne of roadbase basecourse
- 20,000m2 of asphalt pavement









PROJECT UPDATE: BUSHMEAD

Wormall Civil completed bulk earthworks for stages 11 and 12 and have delivered 66 residential lots for stage 12 in 2021. These elevated lots have remarkable city views and have a high-end finish with rendered and stone clad walls.

Wormall Civil have also just been awarded stage 9 bulk earthworks and stage 11 civil works. Both stages commenced in February 2022. Stage 9 includes clearing of 10 hectares of bush whilst complying with environmental guidelines to not disturb the conservations areas or breeding trees surrounding the estate. The bulk earthworks include 50,000m3 of cut/fill along with 100,000 tonne of import fill sand. Works are due to be completed in June 2022.

Stage 11 civil works follows on from the stage 12 works and will deliver another 37 elevated lots some with city views. The scope of works includes deep sewer, storm water and subsoil drainage along with rendered and stone clad walls.

This stage is due for completion in July 2022.









WORMALL COWARA- SOUTH WEST UPDATE

Witchcliffe Ecovillage is situated in the town of Witchcliffe, south of Margaret River and is the second stage of this project awarded to Wormall Civil following the successful delivery of stage 1 in 2020 / 2021.

The project consists of 126 lots ranging in size from 450m2 to 1ha

- 3000m of sewer reticulation which also includes 9 of Smartstream Technology's innovative SmartPit and 1 wastewater pumping station
- 1200m of reinforced concrete drainage & 2900m of PVC drainage
- 2500m of water reticulation, 3000m of electrical cable & 2 transformers
- 5000m of communication pipe & 16000m2 of asphalt pavement in addition to the Bussell Highway intersection works

The Ecovillage site was previously occupied by two farms, an organic vineyard owned by Cape Mentelle and a hobby beef farm. Sustainable Settlements Director and project founder, Mike Hulme, first identified the Ecovillage site in 1994.

The site has the full spectrum of underground services including power, water and communication networks. Challenging ground conditions including laterite rock, granite rock and clay coupled with a high water table had to be overcome during the project.

It has a private sewer network that includes a third pump station (2 installed in initial stage) under this stage pumping to an on site treatment plant that will see treated wastewater re-used for irrigation. The sewer also incorporates the use of Smartstream Technology's Type 1 pits in place of concrete sewer manholes.

A complete road network including a new intersection onto Bussell Highway forms part of this project with a significant amount of footpaths through the open spaces between lots as well as along the highway. The footpath includes sections with a salt finish as a feature.

WORKSHOP UPDATE

We have recently implemented MEX, a cloud based online maintenance system to maintain our expanding machinery fleet in our Perth and South West workshops.

The introduction of MEX should see our workshops be able to track and maintain tight timeframes for minimum downtime onsite, while also having a store feature which will see the stock of critical parts be readily available if there is ever an urgent call to site.

Recently a dust suppression sprinkler system has been installed in the Cardup yard in the way of 13 stations with 26 sprinklers. This will aid in minimising dust that the forklifts and delivery trucks can cause and hopefully bring a little more greenery to the yard!

We have purchased two brand new 35T Sumitomo Excavators and a 14T Sumitomo Excavator to add to our fleet. These machines are our first purchases away from Volvo in sometime and all reports from our machine operators so far are extremely positive and encouraging.

We now have 4 ex-military Scania 4x4 trucks that will be converted into watercarts for our smaller projects, which will be able to handle all aspects of the job from earthworks to roads. Watch this space...

Furthering our "going green" initiatives, we have recently taken delivery of 3 x Model 3 Tesla Long Range vehicles. These vehicles will reduce our fuel/diesel consumption by at least 25,000 litres per year and given the price of fuel this was a simple decision for our bean counters to make.

ALL HANDS ON DECK - SHANE WORMALL ON SITE AND ON THE TOOLS


With the current resourcing challenges facing the civil construction industry, Wormall Civil sees positives in our situation.
